# Meeting Location - Haynes Building

### From I-65 North

- Take I-65 North to the Green Springs Avenue Exit (#258)
- Turn left at the top of the ramp onto Green Springs Avenue.

  Try winds and Martin Lither Kings In
- Turn right onto Martin Luther King, Jr.
   Drive and go 1.6 miles until you reach the Princeton campus on your left.

### From I-65 South

- Take I-65 South to 20 West/59 South toward Tuscaloosa
- Take the Arkadelphia Road Exit (#123) and turn left at the top of the exit ramp
- Follow Arkadelphia Road 1.7 miles until you reach the Princeton campus

### From I-20/59 West

- Take 20 West/59 South to the Arkadelphia Road Exit (#123) and turn left at the top of the exit ramp
- Follow Arkadelphia Road 1.7 miles until you reach the Princeton campus

#### From I-20/59 East

- Take 20 East/59 North to the Arkadelphia Road Exit (#123) and turn right at the top of the exit ramp
- Follow Arkadelphia Road 1.7 miles until you reach the Princeton campus

### From Downtown Birmingham

- · Go West on 6th Avenue South to Elmwood Cemetery.
- Turn right onto Martin Luther King, Jr. Drive and go one mile until you reach the Princeton campus on your left.

Parking- Turn off Lomb Boulevard onto Tuscaloosa Ave. heading west with Princeton BMC on the right. Entrance to Parking Deck will be the first street on the left across from entrance to East Wing Parking lot. Arrangements have been made to have reserved parking on the ground level and additional parking available in lot immediately behind the Haynes Building. Enter the lot by driving through the ground floor of the deck, follow drive around to the left. The entrance to the lot will be to the right. We are asked

# Handicap Parking/Access - Parking Lot Behind Haynes


- Parking is provided in the lot immediately to the rear of Haynes Building.

# Anna Belle Johnson October 28, 1926 — May 19, 2023 Birmingham, Alabama

Anna Belle Briggs Johnson, 96, of Birmingham AL, drew her last breath May 19, 2023. She was born to Nuna B. Briggs and Louise Paasch on Oct. 28,1926 in Bay City, TX.



Her husband, Emmett R Johnson preceded her in death in 2011 after 60 years of marriage. Their children survive: Gay Lynn Johnson and Galen Malcolm Johnson who live in Birmingham. Her only grandchild, Barbara, and her husband Thomas Gardner who live in Austin TX. Of Anna Belle's five siblings only Gene Briggs, of Lake Jackson,TX, now lives.

As a new high school graduate in 1944, Anna Belle read in the newspaper about a public health program, Cadet Nurse Corps, recruiting nurses to address the shortage caused by the war. Anna Belle said Baylor Hospital's school of nursing "opened her world". As a newly certified RN, she moved to Waco, TX to work in the student infirmary while studying for her BSN at Baylor University. She returned to the large hospital setting in Dallas and life immediately changed when she met Emmett. Theirs was a three courtship. So in love they didn't wait for a summer wedding. Mother took her first plant ride to Chicago and they went straight to the pastor's study to get married. Emmett's classmate stood as witnesses. Anna Belle worked while Emmett completed his masters degree at Northwestern.

With opportunities of expanded responsibilities, invitations from Baptist hospitals came asking for Emmett's servant leadership in Paducah KY, Jacksonville FL, Amarillo TX and then in 1975 from Birmingham Baptists. As a dedicated wife, homemaker, and mother, she considered herself an enabler in the journey for Emmett's passion to offer patient care as service to God and community.

With each move they joined a local church which supported family life and community involvement. At times she worked in the nursery, volunteered on missions committees, taught preteens in Sunday School, or served as camp nurse for church camps. In Birmingham she was a faithful member of Mountain

Brook Baptist Church and Hope Sunday School Class. She enjoyed Kenilworth, a literary club, the Cherokee Bend Garden Club, and supporting Samford students with the Legacy League. Anna Belle was a great cook, avid morning walker, gardener, and lover of travel—from camping out west to international trips.

# Gladys Browder Turpin February 6, 1927- February 7, 2023

She was preceded in death by both parents, five brother, and one sister.

Gladys accepted Christ at an early age and was baptized at Flint Hill Baptist Church Verbena, Alabama. Later in life, she moved and joined the Sixth Avenue Baptist Church in Birmingham, Alabama under the leadership of Reverend Jon T. Porter, where she was a former member of the Sanctuary Choir and Sunday School Class #1. She graduated from Chilton High School in Clanton, Alabama and attended Alabama A&M College in Huntsville, Alabama. # Alone and Choking? Self-Heimlich Can Help

It is a natural response to cough when you choke on something (usually food). However, if coughing is not enough to expel the object from your throat, you must perform a Heimlich maneuver on yourself. Choking can block your airways and make it difficult to breathe. In extreme cases, it can lead to death. In fact, choking is the fourth leading cause of unintentional, preventable death.


The Heimlich maneuver involves thrusting the abdomen upwards so the lungs can force enough air to push out the blockage. This first-aid technique is simple to perform on yourself. Learn how to do Heimlich maneuver with only three steps for when you're alone and choking:

## **How To Do Heimlich Maneuver**


The Heimlich maneuver is a safe and quick technique to save a life. You don't need to have any medical training or knowledge to do it. It's a great technique to expel an object from the throat that won't get out through coughing alone.



Put your fist above your navel. The thumb of that hand should rest below your rib cage.



Grab the first fist with your other hand, which you will use to push forcibly inward and upward simultaneously. You can also lean over a railing, table edge or chair backrest. Quickly thrust your upper abdomen against the edge.



Keep pushing your abdomen until the blockage clears.
